He believes that students are more than just a test score, the traditional indicator of readiness. Schuler has testified about college and career readiness before the U.S. Senate Committees on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions and before the House Committees on Education and the Workforce. Dr. Sieu is the daughter of an immigrant family from mainland China. Although she grew up in the back of a laundry, she loved the world of learning in Chicago Public Schools. Dr. Sieu learned English as a second language along with her four siblings and was inspired by the wonderful teachers and principals in her schools. By eighth grade, she was president of the Future Teachers of America. While working as an administrator in ABCUSD, Dr. Sieu also worked as an adjunct professor at the Rossier School of Education at USC for eight years. Although she obtained her Ph.D. in education at UCLA, she supports both the Bruins and the Trojans and refers to herself as a "Brojan." Dr. Sieu is the founder and creator of the ABC Parent Leadership Academy and Conference, which earned the National School Boards Association's Magna Grand Prize Award in 2015. During Dr. Sieu's tenure as superintendent of ABCUSD, all five middle schools have been honored as Schools to Watch/National Model Middle Schools. Dr. Martha James-Hassan is a researcher, teacher and leader with 25 years of experience in PreK-21 urban education. Currently, she serves as the Resolutions and Policy Chair for the Council of Urban Boards of Education Steering Committee, as Secretary on the Executive Leadership Team for the Maryland Association of Boards of Education, as Chair of the SHAPE America Diversity and Inclusiveness Group, and as Chair of the Social Justice and Diversity Task Force for the National Association of Kinesiology in Higher Education. She developed Cultural Fluency as a framework to engage young people, pre-professionals, and in-career individuals and groups in developmentally appropriate reflective experiences exploring identity, privilege and oppression with the intentional objective of promoting historical understandings, individual agency and institutional equity. The 2018 Recipients Are:

TACY ASHBY

Tacy Ashby currently serves as the Senior Vice President of Strategic Educational Alliances at Grand Canyon University (GCU) in Phoenix, Arizona. In that role, she has helped the university become a leader in providing programs for K–12 outreach and support. She retired as Superintendent of Public Instruction for the Arizona Department of Education (ADE). A passionate education advocate, Dr. Ashby has also been a teacher, national Blue Ribbon School principal and university professor. She has used her expertise and collaborative skills to advance school administration success and leadership development through initiation of the Arizona LEADS project at the ADE and the Arizona Superintendents Collaborative Network at GCU, supporting new Arizona superintendents with training and mentors. Dr. Ashby has chaired the boards for the WestEd Educational Research, Development and Service Agency and the Arizona Center for Afterschool Excellence, and she serves on the City of Phoenix Youth and Education Commission as well as the Arizona Commission for Postsecondary Education. She is known for her work in educational advocacy, promoting and mentoring women in leadership, equity and equality for all students, and service to Arizona educators and AASA.

ALTON FRAILEY

Alton Frailey is a 33-year veteran professional educator. Frailey retired in 2016 after serving as superintendent of the nearly 74,000-student Katy Independent School District near Houston, TX, for nine years. He has served as superintendent of the DeSoto Independent School District near Dallas and as Superintendent of Schools for Cincinnati Public Schools in Cincinnati, OH. A classroom veteran, Frailey began his career working with special needs and elementary-aged students in Baytown, TX. He served as a building principal and in various central office positions in the Spring Branch Independent School District in Houston. Frailey has held numerous professional elected leadership positions, including president of the School Superintendents Association (AASA), president of the Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA), president of the Urban Superintendents Association of America (USAA), and president of the Texas Association of Suburban/Mid-Urban Schools (TAS-MUS). He has served on numerous civic boards and in 1999 was elected to the Cypress-Fairbanks Independent School District Board of Trustees, which was selected as the 2002 Texas Honor Board. In 2015, Texas Governor Gregg Abbott appointed Frailey to the Stephen F. Austin State University Board of Regents for a six-year term.

DARLENE PIERCE

Darlene Pierce began her education career teaching the second-grade children of migrant workers in West Sacramento, California. After raising a family, she took over as director for the National Teacher of the Year Program at the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) from 1981–1990, boosting the award ceremony from a low-key, inner office presentation to the national stage of the White House Rose Garden, with the award first presented by the First Lady and then the U.S. President. In 1987, she moved to AASA, where she helped develop the National Superintendent of the Year Program and served as director of the program until 2009. During her 30+ years at AASA she served as Special Projects Manager, Director of the Award and Recognition Programs, Associate Director of AASA's Leadership for Learning Foundation, and Director of Development. Over 40+ years serving public education, she has served on numerous selection committees, including the Disney Salute to the American Teacher. She also helped establish the Teacher of the Year Program in the former Soviet Union (still going on in Russia), as well as a teacher recognition program in Japan. Pierce has, in fact, served as a consultant to most education award programs in the United States. She believes international learning, including travel, is pivotal to an understanding of the world and allows the greatest of our public education professionals an opportunity to share and explore new ideas. Some of these professional explorations with Superintendent of Year award recipients included China, Eastern Europe and Western Europe. With Teacher of the Year award recipients, these experiences included Japan and the Soviet Union with the 1989 National Teacher of the Year, Mary Bicovarious. In 2010, Pierce moved to the National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP), where she was a key part of development projects, retiring in July 2017.

JERRY WEAST

A veteran of education leadership, including 35 years as a superintendent of school districts in five states, Jerry Weast is committed to ensuring all students graduate prepared and inspired for success in college and careers. Founder and president of the Partnership for Deliberate Excellence, through which he works with school districts across the United States to improve the leadership and quality of public education. Dr. Weast's groundbreaking approaches to improving public education are the subjects of case studies by the Harvard Business School, the Pew Foundation, the Foundation for Child Development, the Panasonic Foundation, and the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, and of the book Leading for Equity. Analyses of his successful leadership are featured in several books: Improbable Scholars, Team Turnarounds and Respect; the early childhood education initiatives Dr. Weast led in Montgomery County, MD, are discussed in the book Building Blocks. Dr. Weast led Montgomery County Public Schools to achieve the highest graduation rate among the nation's largest school districts for four consecutive years and the highest academic performance ever in MCPS as the non-English-speaking student population more than doubled and enrollment tipped toward low socioeconomic demographics. During Dr. Weast's tenure, MCPS received the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award for management excellence [2010] and was a 2010 finalist for the Broad Prize in Urban Education.

JANE WESTERHOLD

Jane Westerhold has been an educator for more than 40 years. She retired from Community Consolidated School District 62 in Des Plaines, IL, in 2016 after serving as superintendent for 11 years. One of her many major accomplishments was overseeing the successful completion and opening of a comprehensive early learning center, which was named in her honor in 2015 as the Jane L. Westerhold Early Learning Center. Dr. Westerhold is also passionate about preparing students to be globally competitive and became the driving force behind the digital transformation in teaching and learning in District 62. Dr. Westerhold has served many community and educational organizations. She was the 2015 President of IASA, served on the AASA Governing Board, serves on the National Board for NCERT, and is a past Executive Committee member for DALI. Dr. Westerhold currently is serving as the interim superintendent in North Shore School District 112, Highland Park, IL. In addition to being named Illinois Superintendent of the Year in 2013, her other honors include the Illinois "Those Who Excel" Award of Excellence (2013), the School Business Officials Presidential Award (2015) and the Illinois National School Public Relations Association Distinguished Service Award (2013).

School segregation is a serious barrier to narrowing the achievement gap, and today, schools remain segregated primarily because they are located in segregated neighborhoods. But, as this presentation will show, neighborhoods have been segregated by racially conscious explicit government policy that was openly designed to impose racial segregation on every metropolitan area, and the policies were so powerful that their effects endure and continue to define racial living patterns. Only by familiarizing ourselves with this history of state-sponsored residential segregation can we begin to consider how to fashion remedies.




ANIMATION STORYTELLING INSPIRES STUDENTS TO LEARN

Okmulgee, OK, is a tough city that breeds tough kids. When Lucky Burney started using Wonder Media's Story Maker® a year ago, it was for a class of 28 "I don't want to be here" high schoolers. 

HSD2'S E&R PLAN: LESSONS LEARNED DURING THE **PAST SEVEN YEARS**

Harrison School District Two (HSD2) utilizes the most rigorous pay-for-performance plan in the nation, Effectiveness and Results (E&R). Serving all high-need schools, HSD2 district leaders prioritize maximizing the effectiveness of their employees by connecting the evaluation and compensation system to what the organization values most: effective classroom instruction tied to student achievement results. Educators receive base salaries (not bonuses) determined by their overall effectiveness level, which includes their student achievement data (50%) and their professional practice (50%). This presentation outlines the development, successes and challenges of E&R (as well as literature from both advocates and opponents) and analyzes the program's impact on increasing student achievement. Presenters will illustrate how to incorporate multiple measures of student achievement into teacher and school leader evaluations in conjunction with performance standards, and how districts can manage funds to transition to a pay-for-performance model that yields similar successes.

SHIFTING RESOURCES TO FUND STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Weathering financial pressures is nothing new to districts and district leaders. Through good times and bad, school and district leaders have always worked hard, planned carefully and labored to use taxpayer dollars wisely. However, the recent pressures on district budgets represent a seismic shift. In the past, the tough times typically lasted only a few years. The budget gaps were managed through short-term fixes, such as delaying textbook and technology purchases, deferring maintenance, reducing professional development, and cutting back on instructional coaching; these cuts lasted until spending levels returned to normal. Now, many districts are facing sustained, multi-year funding gaps with no significant relief in sight. If student achievement is to rise and new demands are to be met within the context of the "new normal," school districts need to find new ways to operate with these tighter budgets. Funds for top priorities and new needs must be found within the existing budget and be reallocated to support key strategic efforts. The good news is that not only is this possible, but some of this funding can be found hiding in plain sight. This presentation will share the latest research, compiled over two years from experts across the country and validated by real districts. The panel will focus on three key areas: 1) more effectively matching general education staffing levels to enrollment (especially at the secondary level); 2) cost-effectively improving special education services; and 3) realizing academic



return on investment. We will also address the political and communication aspects of identifying opportunities to shift resources to fund top priorities.

IMPLEMENTING MOBILE TECHNOLOGIES FOR MINIMALLY VERBAL LEARNERS IN A SCHOOL DISTRICT



D E Audience: Rural, Urban

This presentation will demonstrate the implementation of mobile technologies in inclusive and special education classrooms to serve minimally verbal students impacted by autism spectrum disorders or developmental disabilities. About 66% of these children do not have sufficient speech or language when entering kindergarten; establishing even low levels of communication is a crucial need to participate in educational and community settings. New intervention technologies, particularly for language learning, are needed to help reduce the cost to schools and families, estimated at \$268 billion annually in the U.S. and rising to \$461 billion in 2025. However, school districts face challenges for discerning the most effective solutions, implementing them with fidelity, and evaluating benefits and effectiveness. Drawing from an NIH-funded R&D project at Purdue University, the presenter will show how an evidence-based suite of speech and language learning tools was successfully incorporated and evaluated across school districts in northern Indiana and Louisiana.




Cardiac emergencies can be the result of pre-existing or undetected heart conditions and blunt trauma to the chest. The first symptom of sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) is often death, either because the warning signs of an underlying heart condition were not recognized or help was not administered within minutes of the event. In fact, up to 95% of SCA victims die because there was a delay in emergency response. The increased availability of publicly accessible automated external defibrillators (AEDs) in schools and at school-sponsored athletic events will dramatically increase the probability that youth will survive SCA. Knowing and properly executing the critically time-urgent links of the Cardiac Chain of Survival can help save the life of a youth in SCA. Further, a written Cardiac Emergency Response Plan (CERP) is a vital component of being prepared in case of a cardiac emergency.
